OVERVIEW

All 6th grade students are required to read three books: *Drums, Girls, and Dangerous Pie* by Jordan Sonnenblick and two additional books from the 6th Grade Directed Reading List below. Students should not select any texts that they have previously read, and students should submit the reading log to their English teachers when they return to school in August.

The purpose of summer reading at Baylor is to encourage students to develop a life-long habit of reading, echo the students' classroom learning experiences, and provide opportunities for students to read classics and other texts that expand their perspectives and stimulate interest in the world around them.

CLASSICS

***The Westing Game* by Ellen Raskin**

A bizarre chain of events begins when sixteen unlikely people gather for the reading of Samuel W. Westing's will. Although no one knows why the eccentric, game-loving millionaire has chosen a virtual stranger—and a possible murderer—to inherit his vast fortune, one thing's for sure: Sam Westing may be dead...but that won't stop him from playing one last game!

***Anne of Green Gables* by L.M. Montgomery**

Anne of Green Gables recounts the adventures of Anne Shirley, an 11-year-old orphan girl who is mistakenly sent to live with Matthew and Marilla Cuthbert. The family had originally intended to adopt a boy to help them on their farm in Prince Edward Island, but they can't help but be charmed by Anne's spirit. As a child of imagination, Anne takes much joy in life and adapts quickly, thriving in the close-knit farming village. Anne's story is full of humor, and the book follows her adventures at the country school where she quickly excels in her studies, her friendship with Diana Barry, her budding literary ambitions, and her rivalry with classmate Gilbert Blythe.

***Touching Spirit Bear* by Ben Mikaelson**

After severely injuring Peter Driscall in an empty parking lot, troublemaker Cole Matthews is in major trouble. Instead of jail time, Cole is given an alternative: one-year banishment to a remote Alaskan island. This program—called Circle Justice—is based on Native American traditions that provide healing for the criminal mind. To avoid serious jail time, Cole resolves to go. While there, Cole is mauled by a mysterious white bear and left for dead. Thoughts of his abusive parents, helpless Peter, and his violent anger cause him to examine the root of his troubled ways. *Touching Spirit Bear* is a poignant depiction of the vicious cycle of violence and one boy's journey to healing.

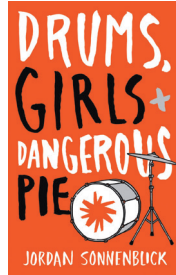

She is reluctant at first, but when the unthinkable happens to Ruth, Isabel realizes her loyalty is available to the bidder who can provide her with freedom.

***Aru Shah and the End of Time* by Roshani Chokshi**

Twelve-year-old Aru Shah has a tendency to stretch the truth in order to fit in at school. While her classmates are jetting off to family vacations in exotic locales, she'll be spending her autumn break at home, in the Museum of Ancient Indian Art and Culture, waiting for her mom to return from her latest archeological trip. Is it any wonder that Aru makes up stories about being royalty, traveling to Paris, and having a chauffeur? One day, three schoolmates show up at Aru's doorstep to catch her in a lie. They don't believe her claim that the museum's Lamp of Bharata is cursed, and they dare Aru to prove it. Just a quick light, Aru thinks, and then she can get herself out of this mess and never ever fib again, but lighting the lamp has dire consequences. She unwittingly frees the Sleeper, an ancient demon whose duty it is to awaken the God of Destruction. Her classmates and beloved mother are frozen in time, and it's up to Aru to save them.

Their plan is to grab Abraham Lincoln's body from its Springfield tomb, stash it in the sand dunes near Lake Michigan, and demand, as a ransom, the release of Ben Boyd and \$200,000 in cash. From here, the action alternates between the conspirators, the Secret Service agents on their trail, and the undercover agent moving back and forth between the two groups. Along the way, readers get glimpses into the inner workings of counterfeiting, detective work, and the early days of the Secret Service.

***The Sword in the Stone* by T.H. White**

Before there was a famous king named Arthur, there was a curious boy named Wart and a kind, old wizard named Merlyn. Transformed by Merlyn into the forms of his fantasy, Wart learns the value of history from a snake, of education from a badger, and of courage from a hawk—the lessons that help turn a boy into a man. Together, Wart and Merlyn take the reader through this timeless story of childhood and adventure.

***Treasure Island* by Robert Louis Stevenson**

As second bests at their school, Jared Mercer and Cheryl Gannett decide to form a club consisting of their school's other second bests. All the kids in *The Shadow Club* are students who also consider themselves to be "in the shadows" of people who are better than them at the things they are good at. The club starts simply enough: the kids who are tired of being second best get together and, for the first time, talk about how they feel. They start by pulling pranks to humiliate their enemies, the "unbeatables," but, their pranks quickly escalate and things begin to spin dangerously out of control.

An investigation drags on, and Mason, honest as the day is long, can't understand why Lieutenant Baird won't believe the story Mason has told about that day. Both Mason and his new friend, Calvin Chumsky, are relentlessly bullied by the other boys in their neighborhood, so they create an underground club space for themselves. When Calvin goes missing, Mason finds himself in trouble again. He's desperate to figure out what happened to Calvin, and eventually, Benny.

She prepares for the trip with advice from Randolph B. Marcy's *The Prairie Traveler*, a few gold dollars and a Springfield single-shot rifle, and is surprised when Billy McCabe, Agatha's unrequited love interest, shows up to accompany her. She will track every last clue and shred of evidence to bring Agatha home. Yet even with resolute determination and her trusty Springfield single-shot, Georgie is not prepared for what she faces on the Western Frontier.

***The Hobbit* by J.R.R. Tolkien**

Bilbo Baggins is a hobbit who enjoys a comfortable, unambitious life, rarely traveling any farther than his pantry or cellar, but his contentment is disturbed when the wizard Gandalf and a company of dwarves arrive on his doorstep one day to whisk him away on an adventure. They have launched a plot to raid the treasure hoard guarded by Smaug the Magnificent, a large and very dangerous dragon. Bilbo reluctantly joins their quest, unaware that on his journey to the Lonely Mountain he will encounter both a magic ring and a frightening creature known as Gollum.

***Watership Down* by Richard Adams**

Set in the Hampshire Downs in Southern England, an idyllic rural landscape, this stirring tale of suspense follows a band of rabbits in flight from the incursion of man and the destruction of their home. Meanwhile, Daniel is on his way to an interview as part of his application process to Yale. He is under great pressure to get in because his parents (who emigrated from South Korea) are adamant that he become a doctor. Events slowly conspire to bring the two leads together, and when Daniel and Natasha finally meet, he falls in love immediately and convinces her to join him for the day.

Expecting to hear that Mrs. Janssen wants meat or kerosene, Hanneke is shocked by the older woman's frantic plea to find a person—a Jewish teenager Mrs. Janssen had been hiding, who has vanished without a trace from a secret room. Hanneke initially wants nothing to do with such dangerous work, but she is ultimately drawn into a web of mysteries and stunning revelations that lead her into the heart of the resistance, open her eyes to the horrors of the Nazi war machine, and compel her to take desperate action.
